<u>Our Purpose</u> The purpose of our church is to make a difference by serving others through God's love and our faith.

The liturgical year comes to a close in November. This month is filled with end-times, or eschatological scripture readings. The bookends, All Saints on Nov. 5 and Christ the King on Nov. 26 mark festivals that remind us of the heavenly saints who have gone on to eternal life and the earthly saints who look with hope to the second coming of Christ.

All Saints can be a difficult festival for families who lost loved ones over the past year. This year, we sigh deeply with sadness and for some, we shed tears, as we remember beloved saints. See page 7 of this newsletter for those who will be remembered this year with family members or special friends placing a white rose in the baptismal font as names are read.

All Saints can be a turning point for families in mourning. This festival is another reminder that God promises us eternal life in the waters of baptism and that in death, this promise has been fulfilled. Loved ones are truly at rest in the eternal arms of Jesus, the Good Shepherd.

All Saints is a time of thanksgiving. We give thanks for the multitude of ways that our loved ones influenced lives—the life of families, school, work and social circles, and the life of the faith community. I invite you to reflect on the list of saints who we will remember this year and the ways that they influenced this faith community by their service and presence among us. Let's light a candle in their memory and in memory of other beloved saints who influenced us—by their example as the faithful children of God, by their breath of forgiveness, and by their depth of love for family, neighbor and for God.

As I reflect on this list of saints, I give thanks for the ways that each one touched my life—by their leadership, by their creative ideas, by their expressions of thanksgiving for my pastoral care, by the privilege of officiating at the service celebrating their life. I am forever grateful for the honor of humbly walking with these saints in their time of need and serving the families in their time of grief.

We turn our attention to two Sundays of "ordinary" time in the Season after Pentecost, then bring the liturgical year to a close—first with the Thanksgiving holiday when we give thanks for all of God's blessings, and then with Christ the King when we give thanks for Jesus who gave his life on the cross for the forgiveness of sin, who was raised from the dead so that we might also live a new life after our bodily death, and who promises to return once and for all to make all things new. The scripture readings this year are about judgment—the separation of the sheep and the goats—but are also filled with hope in the promises of Christ.

The Gospel text, Matthew 25:31-46, is the one that Grace claims as "Our Story," printed on the last page of the worship bulletin. It is a reminder that those who are judged to be worthy for the kingdom of heaven are those who feed the hungry, welcome the stranger, clothe and shelter the poor and homeless, and visit those in prison (or in any confined situation such as the homebound, those in the hospital and those in long term care). I invite you to reflect on the way (s) that you live out this story. How have the heavenly saints influenced you to serve God's children? How do earthly saints encourage and support you in your service to others?

Let us remember. Let us give thanks. Let us live with gracious, love-filled spirits to continue the work of the saints and to further the kingdom of God on this earth.

We completed an engaging study of the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7) in October to prepare us for a study of the ELCA social statements. After an introduction to the social statements on November 5, two or more will be

selected by the class for a deeper study for the remaining Sundays in November. Since 1991 the ELCA has been creating social statements—teaching and policy documents that provide a framework for the church and its members to think, discuss and act on social issues from a perspective that intersects faith and society. "Social teaching documents aren't confessional or litmus tests, meaning you're only Lutheran if you believe every word, but they put into writing the faith-based thinking about social issues that guides members and the public work of our church," Willer said. "Social teaching documents think through—from the perspective of faith—the frameworks needed for discerning God's call to be people who love, seek justice and respond to social issues." [Roger Willer, ELCA director for theological ethics with the Office of the Presiding Bishop.]

In December, we will turn to an Advent study. The specific theme will be announced closer to the start of this season of hope and preparation for the coming of Jesus, the infant born in a stable, God Incarnate—Immanuel (God with Us)



• Council approved a stipend for Eli Wright who served in the kitchen at Camp Nawakwa in the summer.

• Council voted to set Congregational meetings for after the services on November 11 and 12, 2023 to recommend to the congregation that Grace move forward with the purchase of a new Allen Digital Organ, model GX350DK in the amount of \$138, 525.00 plus shipping costs up to \$1000.00.

- Council voted to approve reimbursement of expenses for Jesse Woodrow to attend the Youth Ministry Network's Extravaganza in New Orleans, LA in January 2024.
- Council voted to sell the 14-passenger van, which will not pass inspection, to Jonathan Ponulak, a friend of Don Schell's, for \$2000.00.
- Susan Dickinson presented a preliminary budget for 2024 which will be finalized by the end of 2023.

What do we really own?

'Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked shall I return there; the Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord.' --Job:1:21

There's the joke about the nosy neighbor attending a rich woman's funeral. Peering into the coffin with a friend, he asked, "How much money did she leave?" The friend smiled and replied, "All of it, of course!"

As Job laments, we come into the world naked and leave the same way. We may be dressed in our best clothing on our way out, but we take it to the grave, not the afterlife.

The joke and Job reveal a basic concept of stewardship: We don't really own anything. We may take possession of it for a period of time, but we eventually leave it for others.

Yet we spend so much of our energy and life accumulating more and more – as if we were going to have it forever, as we were going to live forever. The danger is that absorbed with accumulating wealth, we shortchange the most valuable treasures – loving the Lord our God with all our being and loving our neighbors as ourselves.

That's why the Bible consistently warns us about wealth. Jesus repeatedly points out the pitfalls. Money and possessions can turn us inward, stunting our growth and preventing us from being the people God created us to be.


Generosity is the preventative cure for this malady. The Bible counsels that tithing – giving away 10 percent of our income – is a good benchmark for faithful giving (although on several occasions Jesus told his disciples to give away ALL their possessions).

Giving 10 percent, or any amount substantial enough to be sacrificial, is a declaration that you are free from the power that money might have over you. Because however much money you can accumulate in life, you will be like the rich woman in the joke: You will leave it all.

Kentland Project Progress Report

Demolition has been completed. In the beginning of October the volunteers pressure washed the exterior of the building, tore down the shed at the athletic field, cleaned out the site of the old play area and filled a third dumpster. The play area site and the shed site have been leveled, raked and seeded. According to the weight of the three dumpsters, the old ceilings/interior walls, and miscellaneous old construction debris that was removed weighed nearly 16,000 lbs.!!! We also took construction debris to the scrap yard and received money for the remodel.

The project has now entered the rebuilding phase. GS Flook is working on updating our electrical and lighting system, which will include new LED lighting throughout the building. While they are completing their activities, volunteers have concentrated on a variety of smaller but important updates such as painting the exterior doors and trim, as well as the front and back porches. On the interior, we have begun rehabbing the interior doors, and we're almost complete on a makeover of the fireplace! The restored fireplace will showcase a new mantel cut from a fallen oak tree on the premises.

Also on the interior, we have received our new windows and sliding glass doors for the west wall.

On Friday October 20th, we hosted 23 students from Cedar Cliff High School, who volunteered their day to help with the work effort! The students helped with some of our exterior painting on the porches, the fireplace makeover, and with some construction work on the sleeping area ceilings. They also made quick work of breaking down some of the rotted picnic tables around the firepit, as well as cleaning out the supply closet.

In the next two weeks, we will be:

- Installing the remaining new ceiling joists in the sleeping rooms
- Replumbing/moving water lines to coexist with new ceiling joists
- Framing the west wall including rough openings for windows and doors
- Installing the new windows and doors
- Finishing our interior door rehab/update
- Finishing the exterior trim painting
- Adding fascia board to outside porch roofs


