

# Good News from Grace

March 2024

#### <u>Our Purpose</u>

The purpose of our church is to make a difference by serving others through God's love and our faith.

Mid-March holds a commemoration of Patrick, bishop and missionary to Ireland. This commemoration, fondly called St. Patrick's Day and celebrated on March 17, often "gets lost" in the midst of Lent. Most people associate this day as one to drink Guinness, enjoy corned beef and cabbage, wear green and celebrate all things Irish. But very few people know the true story of the patron saint of Ireland.

Patrick was born Maewyn Succat around 385 in Kilpatrick, Scotland. He was captured by pirates at age 16 during a raid of his hometown and sold into slavery in Ireland where he herded sheep. At the time he was captured, Ireland was inhabited predominantly by Druids and pagans. Maewyn learned the language of the Irish, their customs and pagan beliefs.

However, Maewyn never forgot about God and prayed to the Lord every single day. Some traditions claim that on certain days, he would pray over 100 times.

Six years after he had been captured, God came to Maewyn in a dream and told him to leave Ireland by traveling to the coast. There he boarded a ship back to Britain where he was reunited with his family.

Another dream led him back to Ireland to teach the people about God. Maewyn began religious studies to become a priest. He was ordained by St. Germanus.

Sometime between his service as priest and his ordination as bishop in 432, Maewyn had taken the name Patrick. Pope Celestine I sent Patrick to Ireland to support a small community of Christians living there and to spread the word of God to the Irish people. He preached for 40 years and made an everlasting imprint and legacy to many believers. Patrick supported church officials, founded monasteries, and organized dioceses (like the synods in the Lutheran Church body).

Patrick is credited with introducing the Celtic cross that consisted of symbols from both Pagan practices and Christianity. He is also honored and associated with legends such as when he drove away all the snakes from Ireland and introducing the Holy Trinity through the three-leaved shamrock.



After years of living in poverty,

traveling and enduring much suffering, he died on March 17, 461 at Saul, where he had built the first church.

Our hymnal, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* (ELW), includes a hymn (#450) attributed to Patrick, "I Bind unto Myself Today." The tune, an Irish melody, is named "St. Patrick's Breastplate." The hymn is not an easy one to sing because of the changing melody, but the text reflects a strong trinitarian theology rooted in the Incarnation, baptism and Resurrection of Christ. Stanza 4 is particularly moving:

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me. Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.



The schedule has been adjusted to reflect cancelled gatherings due to


inclement weather.

## WE ARE SO EXCITED AND APPRECIATIVE!

FINANCE & STEWARDSH

The Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team would like to extend a huge Thank You to the Grace Congregation for your wonderful response to our Second Annual Pledge Appeal.

TIMANCE & In 2023 we received 53 pledges totaling \$157,400 of which 95% was TEWARDSHIP satisfied.

So far for 2024 we received 75 pledges totaling \$220,060. This represents a 41% increase in the number of pledges presented and a 40% increase in dollars pledged. Way to go Members!!

We as a congregation approved our 2024 budget of \$348,495. Two-thirds of that amount has been pledged so far... It is never too late for anyone to put in their pledge card. We have pledge cards available for anyone who misplaced their card or forgot to get in on the excitement of reaching higher for our budget goals.

## Lenten thoughts about wealth

Jesus taught, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; life does not consist in an abundance of possessions." **-Luke 12:15 (NIV)** 

For centuries, Christians have observed the season of Lent by taking on new spiritual practices (such as special prayer or bible reading) or abstaining from things that are enjoyable or extravagant (such as tobacco, chocolate or alcohol).

Lenten disciplines assist us in looking inward, seeing ourselves for who we really are, and with God's help, identifying things that keep us from drawing closer to God. With these awarenesses, and with God's help, we can then do something about them.

It's only fitting that Christians look at their relationship with wealth. Jesus had no problem with wealth, per se, but he repeatedly warns that wealth can distort our values and put a wedge between us and God. Or, worse, that money can supplant God as ruler in our hearts.

For those of us who are comfortable in our incomes and possessions, Lent invites us to look at our relationship with wealth. Here are some ideas for thought and prayer:

Jesus says, "Life does not consist in an abundance of possessions." How is that different from the relentless message our consumer culture gives us? In what, then, would Jesus say our life consists? In what does your life consist?

For Lent, keep a journal of everything you buy. At the end of Lent, analyze what your purchases say about your values, identity, and relationship with wealth.

For Lent, buy only things you *need*, and NOT things you merely *want*. What do you learn in the process.

For Lent, double your regular giving to charity. Or simply give to the point where it is a sacrifice.

If you dare, try tithing – giving 10 percent of your income to God's work. What do you learn about yourself?

May this Lent be a time when you draw close to the Lord your God.
