when I made mistakes, for laughing at my lame sermon jokes!



Let's repeat this for a few months until Pastor Chad is comfortable with our names.



#### The Mutual Ministry Team

A valuable resource for every pastor and congregation is the formation of a team to "nurture and strengthen relationships within the group, working toward healthy mutuality, primarily for the sake of the ministry and mission of the congregation."

At the May 13, 2024 meeting, the Congregation Council appointed the following members to a Mutual Ministry

This six member team will meet at least every other month, and perhaps monthly, to build relationships among the team members and with Pastor Butz.

Two members will rotate off the team after one year of service, two more members after two years of service, and two other members after three years of service, allowing for two new members to be appointed by the Council President and Pastor Chad each year, to serve a three year term.

Other responsibilities of the team include:

- Serve as a "focus group," representative of the congregation, as leaders share ideas for ministry and seek to assess how best to accomplish what is being proposed.
- Be alert to the early warning signs within a congregation of misunderstanding that may eventually lead to difficulty.
- Provide a means to resolve concerns/problems; however, this team is not the "complaint committee."
- Serve as a source of support for the Senior Pastor in times of personal or professional stress.

Let's embrace the work of this newly formed team and give thanks for those who are serving.

- The agenda for the June 16, 2024 Congregational Meeting was approved.


## FROM THE TREASURER

#### Offering Envelopes and Contributions

There still have been some issues regarding how contribution are being turned in. Please follow the steps below when completing your offering envelopes.

- 1. Use an envelope for all contributions. Please do not place loose checks or cash in the plate. Envelopes can be found in either narthex, in the library, in the parking lot hallway by the bulletin board or requested from the church office.
- 2. Write your name or envelope number on the envelope. If you need your envelope number you may contact Diane Deppen in the church office. If it is your first time using an offering envelope please fill out the information in the purple box. (*This can also be used to make any changes to your information*)
- 3. Place contributions *for one family member only* in an envelope. If there are multiple family members such as parents and confirmed youth, each one needs to complete their own envelope.
- 4. Complete the information in the green box. If you mark Special Offering Ministry the contribution will go towards the Monthly Special Benevolence. If you wish to contribute to a specific campaign or organization such as the Youth Ministry, he Giving Pantry etc. then select Other and indicate the amount. Under Comments write the name of the organization(s) and the amount for each one if there are multiple selections.
- 5. Each envelope should contain <u>only (1) check</u>. Please do not write separate checks for offering and each organization. Either put it all on one check and follow step 4 above for completing the envelope or place each check in an individual envelope and complete the front as indicated in step 4.

#### Grace's Book Club

Grace's Book Club will next be reading "Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane by Lisa See.

The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane is a novel by contemporary American writer Lisa See. See is one-eighth Chinese, and most of her books feature Chinese history and traditions. First published in 2017, The Tea Girl of

Hummingbird Lane centers around the story of a young girl named <u>Li-yan</u>, who lives with her family in remote tea mountains of China. In their everyday life, her village relies on rituals, belief, and taboos, and they are very detached from the rest of the country. This changes when a stranger arrives in a car, the fist vehicle the people in Li-yan's village have ever seen. He serves as a link that eventually connects the village with the outside world, and Li-yan becomes the first in her community to consider leaving the mountain and getting an education. Her plans change when she gets pregnant out of wedlock, and the subsequent decision she makes has a lasting effect on her life and the life of her daughter. Exploring the themes of identity and belonging, <u>the mother-daughter bond</u>, and the effects of progress, the novel brought See great acclaim, in particular for her thorough exploration of Chinese teagrowing culture.

Our new organ has 66 stops, 3 wooden manuals, Genisys technology (pre-recorded instrumental sounds not typically found on traditional organs), a 16 channel expansion (speakers/audio), an adjustable bench, a 128 level memory, and many other exciting features. #### Choose the Path of Life - of Unity

Grace, peace and mercy to you from God in heaven and Jesus, who lovingly prays for us. Amen.

#### 80 + CB

My call to serve congregations during times of transition from one long-term pastor to the next has some challenging phases. One of my favorite phases of transitional ministry is connecting with a congregation at the beginning — meeting the people, hearing their stories of the times when the congregation flourished and grew, and sadly, the stories of conflict and fear for the future, and working together to determine the best direction for health. Another favorite part of interim ministry is to reach the milestone of unity — that is, when the congregation sees that they can, in fact, work together to achieve long sought after goals. Things like division, disagreement, competing wants, arrogance and other undesirable attributes blocked the congregation from seeing and hearing God's goal to follow a constructive path toward a new future. My least favorite part of interim ministry is leaving. However, as we emphasize in the training for intentional interim ministry, entering and leaving are vital to the success of the interim period, to prepare the congregation for the start of the newly called long-term pastor.

With some tongue in cheek humor, I don't have an evangelist like John to write an eloquent prayer before I leave the interim setting. This prayer of chapter 17, offered by Jesus before he goes to his death on the cross, is known as Jesus' high priestly prayer. The prayer begins by focusing on Jesus' glorification [1-5]. Then, he prays for his disciples [6-19] which is the section that we read today. The prayer concludes with Jesus' request for his disciples' unity and mutual love [20-26], and extends to the present day – to us, the recipients of the testimony of the first disciples. Immediately following the prayer, Jesus and his disciples go across the Kidron Valley to the garden where Judas will betray him.

Jesus' prayer includes four interrelated requests which are relevant for this final phase of interim ministry for us today. As explained by the commentary of the Rev. Dr. Veronice Miles of Wesley Seminary. "First, [Jesus] asks God to protect them from fragmentation so that they will remain one in heart, purpose and intent, and that they will come to know themselves as one body, one communion, one fellowship despite their many differences, nullifying the impulse

toward division and discord." I did not take the time to review my sermons over the past two years for a count, but I know that I have addressed the value of unity many times – that is, to remain focused on the same mission and vision for the sake of Jesus Christ – not for the sake of one individual or group over another. We know the pain and grief that division and conflicts cause. It certainly changes a congregation – both physically and spiritually. And sometimes, a lot of good comes from such division, allowing for a good pruning of the vine to grow in new directions. But such pruning is painful. I pray that you will take this part of Jesus' prayer to heart and continue to strive for unity, abiding in the love of Jesus, keeping Jesus at the center of all that you say and do.

"Second, he prays that the joy [Greek  $char\acute{a}$ ] he has known will be made complete or full [Greek  $pl\bar{e}r\acute{o}\bar{o}$ ] in those who know him [17:13; see also 15:11]." Jesus "desires that they will experience such delight and joy in doing the work of the ministry that it fills every hollow space, so that worldly enticements will no longer hold sway over them." I have seen the many avenues of service that bring you joy. I have also heard the stories of worldly enticements that held you captive. Let your joy be complete so that the fears and lures of the world do not hold you captive. I encourage you to prayerfully find a niche that makes good use of your time and talents, to further the ministries of this congregation and of outreach organizations.

Third, in verse 15, "Jesus asks God to 'protect them from the evil one." The evil one is the embodiment of all that is opposed to God. "Jesus is asking God to protect his disciples from all that opposes God." The psalm for today (Psalm 1) captures this division by addressing two ways of living – the wicked way and the good way. This psalm is referred to as the "Two Ways" because it outlines two different paths that a person can follow throughout their life. Those who walk in the way of righteousness will flourish. In contrast, those who walk in the way of wickedness will flounder.

There is no doubt about it — people would much rather belong to a faith community that is uplifting, where there is mutual respect toward one another — including their pastor and lay leaders, that is walking the talk — the talk of the Lord that is, where they can find peace. No one wants to belong to a group that is

cranky, constantly grumbling, finding fault, picking on one another, and just being mean, plastering a smile on their faces as a hypocrite would do. No, folks want to belong to a congregation that radiates with joy, that is the model of unity, that gets along with one another, that reflects the agape form of love – the love that gives to others.

"Finally, Jesus prays, 'Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth' (17:17). Reiterating verse 8, Jesus asks God to set them apart (Greek *hagiázō*) for the work of the ministry, to embolden and empower them to bear witness to the word of truth they have received even as the world seeks to negate and inhibit their proclamation and practices of faith. For Jesus himself was set apart, or sanctified, for this ministry."<sup>4</sup>

We are set apart to do the work of the Lord. You have accomplished great things during this interim time. You have discovered, once again, that you can do the Lord's work by focusing on Jesus, not on yourselves and not allowing worldly issues to dominate your landscape. As we hear in Psalm 1, the righteous orient their life around the will of God. This doesn't mean that a righteous person never sins or messes up. Instead, a righteous person is defined by the path that they are walking. The righteous are those who, when they stumble off the path, let God help them find their way again. They know that God's way is the only way to life.

And that brings us to this beautiful image in the middle of the psalm. The righteous are "like trees planted by streams of water, bearing fruit in due season, with leaves that do not wither; everything they do shall prosper." The pathway of righteousness is the only path to life.

Those of us who know Jesus today can take solace in verses 20–21, as they remind us that Jesus' prayer extends into the present moment. We are recipients of those first disciples' testimony. We also endeavor to keep Jesus' ministerial vision alive. Therefore, we can take comfort in knowing that Jesus' intercessory prayer from long ago remains effectual for our lives today. We are to live as righteous people, "like trees planted by streams of water, bearing fruit in due season, with leaves that do not wither; everything they do shall prosper."

Jesus said, "You will know them by their fruits" (Matthew 7:16). The choice is ours – we choose which path to follow: the path that destroys life or the path that gives life and bears fruit. You have chosen the path of life.

A changed life, whether for an individual or for a faith community, is the gift of God's Spirit. Paul described this new life, the life for which we were made, as "the fruit of the Spirit;" not "the fruit of my good intentions." "The fruit of the spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things" (Galatians 5:22).

Let the words of Jesus' high priestly prayer resonate with you. Read it for devotions before a meeting. Meditate on it. I rejoice that I am leaving a unified congregation, one that focuses on Jesus, one that stretches upward to be nourished by God, one that has deep roots for stability and growth. You are ready for your next phase – to receive a newly called pastor to build a new future. Do so with grace and let the wind of the Spirit take you into new ventures, of which you do not know the ending. Amen.
